"The parish is not an outdated institution; precisely because it possesses great flexibility, it can assume quite different contours depending on the openness and missionary creativity of the pastor and the community. While certainly not the only institution which evangelises, if it proves capable of self-renewal and constant adaptivity, it continues to be 'the Church living in the midst of the homes of her sons and daughters'. This presumes that it really is in contact with the homes and the lives of its people, and does not become a useless structure out of touch with people or a self-absorbed cluster made up of a chosen few. The parish is the presence of the Church in a given territory, an environment for hearing God's word, for growth in the Christian life, for dialogue, proclamation, charitable outreach, worship and celebration. In all its activities the parish encourages and trains its members to be evangelisers. It is a community of communities, a sanctuary where the thirsty come to drink in the midst of their journey, and a centre of constant missionary outreach. We must admit, though, that the call to review and renew our parishes has not yet sufficed to bring them nearer to people, to make them environments of living communion and participation, and to make them completely mission-oriented. (Evangelii Gaudium, 28)


Assembly Process

In order to focus our efforts, and also to be inclusive of all parishioners' input on how to 'be parish', we required a formal process of listening to each other and discerning our way forward together. In order to, discern our way forward in this endeavour navigating the complex desires, emotions, understandings etc. we

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him and he will guide your path.

(Prov 3: 4-5)

utilised a tailored version of Nominal Group Technique to listen, and allow Holy Spirit to enthuse and direct our paths. For the purpose of this process the **thematic areas of the 2020 plenary** process were utilised to focus our questioning.



Thematic Areas:

- 1. Missionary and Evangelising
- 2. Inclusive, Participatory and Synodal
- 3. Prayerful and Eucharistic
- 4. Humble, Healing and Merciful
- 5. A Joyful, Hope-filled and Servant Community
- 6. Open to Conversion, Renewal and Reform

After receiving input on these topics the Assembly was broken up into small groups for discernment and feedback. In each group there was a group leader who's task it was to facilitate, in an orderly way, the group process.

The question

"What would we look like, or, what would we be doing if we were successfully living this theme?"

Each participant was asked to quietly reflect on this question and imagine the parish successfully living each thematic area, then write down 1 to 3 short punchy statements that characterise this success. (All ideas were shared and can be found in the Appendix). Reviewing the list, the group was then asked to rank their top 1/3 of responses, the top 2 responses for each group were shared with the Assembly and formed the **priority responses** that went back to the Pastoral Council for prioritisation.

The Fellowship

After the discernment and feedback was completed we all shared in a time of fellowship and a wonderful lunch. The atmosphere was great as we did what we do best in our parish; spend time together.

Pastoral Council Discernment

After the Assembly it was the task of the Pastoral Council to further discern the prioritisation of the responses. To do this four questions were established prior to the Assembly by which each statement could be assessed, further discussion was also engaged to expand some ideas and merge similar concepts. Based on this assessment the responses were ranked identifying our priority areas which, as a community, we will direct our attention. The outcome of this assessment highlighted three main areas of attention to

focus on the coming 1 to 3 years. All the responses fitted into the main areas of: **Formation, Outreach, and Parish Culture**.


Pastoral Responses

Outreach

- Welcoming teams-Before mass welcome new people
- Celebrate people in our community and welcome new people
- Reaching out sick, old people visitations—An active commitment to local vulnerable people
- Evangelise family and friends first
- Re-engagement/support of families of those who are newly baptised
- Keep opening up participation groups; ongoing invitation of inclusiveness—Hold regular parish events, additional to mass to draw in a wider range of people
- Organise parish activities for adults, youth and children
- A cherishing of all life, through education, prayers and remembrances; including a commitment to our environment; a dedication to mothers and unborn children etc. Life in all its forms.

Formation

- Understanding the meaning of the mass and persevere with this understanding
- Re-affirm importance of Eucharist including explanation of what it means
- Greater emphasis on confession—Times set for regular reconciliation as a community and promoted

- Faith events, parish days, celebrations, social gatherings, friendships, meals
- Increase opportunities for fellowship and faith sharing within the parish (they'll know we are Christians by our love).
- More volunteers involved in cleaning church, events, running of parish etc.
- Support parishioners in engaging annually in retreat

- Being a parish that is open/extends a welcome to all who may want to be a part of our community
- A parish where we all work together to enjoy the good news and help where needed in spreading the good news
- Encourage, accept and listen to all (Culturally diverse, old and new people, shy and confident)

Pastoral Areas Requiring Further Discernment

Outreach

- Opening the church to other groups to use
- More inclusivity of non-Catholics in our celebrations
- Renewal for the sanctity of the Eucharist; regular prayer events, more adoration, benediction, prayer for church and religion—More people attending services and respect for the Eucharist
- More compassion and support for victims of sexual abuse
- Make help available for parishioners in need
- Suggestion box in church (queries, questions)

Formation

Diversity in group prayer groups where we teach prayer – age, gender etc

Parish Culture

- "Be There" for others in daily life
- Live your faith with the holy spirit evident
- All parishioners to greet each with a smile
- Start in the family

All other input from the Assembly can be found in the Appendix. Please note: this is not a process of what we won't do, but rather an identification of what we will focus on in the coming years. All are expected to discern God's will in their lives and diligently walk in that path. If there is something not on this list you feel motivated to achieve, that may be all that is required to make something a priority.

Actions moving forward

Early in 2020 we will action each of the pastoral responses. Each area requires a final step of discernment "how are we/do we practically achieve this goal"? This will provide us with tasks and goals which are achievable, measurable and able to be celebrated. It also provides each of us with clear boundaries within which we can give of our time and talent without it overwhelming us. The only way to be effective in our life together as a parish family is that each one of us contribute what we can (no one is expecting more than that).

What is being seriously requested of each of us.

As a baptised Christians we are anointed priest prophet and king. In Confirmation we commit to living this truth. As St Paul tells us "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can anyone preach unless they are sent? As it is written: "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" (Rom 10:13-15)

It seems clear that Holy Spirit is challenging us to act prophetically in our community; this is who you are. St Irenaeus tells us that the glory of God is a person fully alive. We are fully alive when we realise our identity in Christ and live from this truth. As the words of our own baptismal anointing declare "God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ has freed you from sin, given you a new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, and welcomed you into his holy people. He now anoints you with the chrism of salvation. As Christ was anointed Priest, Prophet, and King, so may you live always as a member of his body, sharing everlasting life"

The Personal Challenge

In the next two months reflect over the list of pastoral responses, and the work you already do, and get a sense of what areas you will contribute towards in the parish. At the beginning of February participate in the action meetings.

Let us see what Holy Spirit can do in us and through us!
